- 1. When was the last time you felt in danger? Would you put yourself into that place again?
- 2. If you could change one thing about yourself, what would you change?

(Questions based on the primary texts)

Read II Corinthians 11:16-12:10.

- 3. False teacher have come to Corinth adding the Law to the message of the gospel found in Jesus. How does Paul's "boasting" about his weaknesses parody the big claims made by people claiming spiritual superiority?
- 4. What does Paul's suffering add to his credibility? In our day, do we connect credibility with weakness/suffering?
- 5. Paul (and Jesus) were misunderstood when it came to their gentleness. In what ways can we confuse aggression with leadership or gentleness with weakness?
- 6. If this passage were Paul's resume, would any churches higher him? Why or why not?
- 7. How has Paul's "thorn" affected his life? What does it mean that God's grace was sufficient for him versus having his "thorn" taken away?
- 8. What is it like to prayer earnestly for something to change and not see that answered? What does Paul's experience with his unanswered prayer help us to learn in those moments?
